In the Christian biblical context, particularly in the Gospel of John, there is a verse that has resonated through centuries regarding truth and lies. John 8:44 refers to Satan as a deceiver, and it states:

"You belong to your father, the devil, and you want to carry out your father's desires. He was a murderer from the beginning, not holding to the truth, for there is no truth in him. When he lies, he speaks his native language, for he is a liar and the father of lies."

This verse is often invoked to illustrate the spiritual and moral implications of deception. In this context, lying is not merely a social or diplomatic misstep, but a fundamental moral wrong that aligns with the forces of evil as represented by Satan. In the broad sweep of Biblical narrative, truth is a divine attribute and is integral to the nature of God, and thus, to the lives of believers.

Applying this to the discourse on 'amimut', we might consider the ethical dimensions of statecraft. If deception is fundamentally at odds with divine principles, then policies based on deception might be said to stand in opposition to these moral imperatives. This framing encourages a reflection on the nature of state actions and their alignment with broader ethical and spiritual principles.

The Epilogue would suggest that for Israel, a nation with a profound connection to Biblical history and ethics, the policy of 'amimut' might be seen as conflicting with the values of truth and transparency that are so deeply woven into the fabric of its cultural and religious identity. It might posit that a reconsideration of such policies could be in alignment not only with strategic and

diplomatic imperatives but also with the moral and spiritual heritage that holds truth as a paramount virtue.
