Isaiah, too, embodied the Watchman's spirit. In Isaiah 21:11–12, he speaks of the Watchman's weary vigilance: "Watchman, what of the night? Watchman, what of the night?" Ezekiel himself serves as both the definitional and practical model of the Watchman. In exile among the Babylonian captives, Ezekiel's prophetic ministry involved vivid symbolic acts, unrelenting denunciations of Israel's sin, and unwavering fidelity to his commission even when his audiences refused to listen. His obedience stands as a lasting testament to the Watchman's call.

cornerstone, for the Watchman must adhere to his task whether or not he is heard, liked, or believed. Courage is necessary because the Watchman faces not only public scorn but often the wrath of rulers, religious authorities, and the general populace. Rejection is an expected outcome, not an anomaly, and a true Watchman must steel himself to deliver his message without regard for personal consequence.

The role of the Watchman is, therefore, profoundly sacrificial. It demands the surrender of human approval, the endurance of misunderstanding and hostility, and the unwavering commitment to speak truthfully on behalf of God, regardless of the outcome. In this way, the Watchman's ministry anticipates the profound spiritual endurance that will later define the Remnant.

warnings (Jeremiah 36:23). Ezekiel was told in advance by God that the people would refuse to listen: "And you shall speak my words to them, whether they hear or refuse to hear, for they are a rebellious house" (Ezekiel 2:7). Even Jesus Christ, the ultimate Prophet, was rejected by the religious leaders of his day, fulfilling the pattern that "a prophet is not without honor except in his hometown and among his relatives and in his own household" (Mark 6:4).

This refusal to listen inevitably invites collapse. The city that rejects the warning does not stand; it falls, not because of an arbitrary divine punishment, but because its foundations have already been undermined by injustice, idolatry, and moral decay. The Watchman's role is not to cause the collapse but to expose its inevitability if repentance is not forthcoming. His warning is a final opportunity for mercy, not a threat.

The pattern of prolonged disobedience leading to collapse is consistent throughout the Biblical narrative. Rebellion against God's commands results first in internal rot — the fraying of justice, the corruption of leadership, the oppression of the weak — and then in external destruction, whether by foreign invasion, economic ruin, or divine intervention.
