One of the most contentious aspects of the law is its provision allowing for cases to be tried in mainland China under certain circumstances, a move that raises concerns about the fairness and transparency of trials, given the mainland's judicial system's opaque nature and the high conviction rates in political cases. Moreover, the law permits the establishment of specialized secret security agencies in Hong Kong, operating outside the local legal framework, further undermining the territory's judicial independence and autonomy.

Additionally, the law's provisions for handling national security cases signify a departure from Hong Kong's common law traditions. For instance, the potential for trials without juries and the possibility of life sentences for a broad range of offenses mark a significant shift in the territory's approach to justice and legal process. These changes not only impact those accused under the law but also send a chilling effect across society, as the wide

latitude given to authorities to define and prosecute national security threats could lead to self-censorship and a reduction in the civic space for debate and dissent.
